10 November 2006 A MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDANT OF THE MARINE CORPS

On November 10th, 1775 our Corps was born as the Continental Congress raised the "first and second battalions of American Marines." Each year as we celebrate our birthday, we pause to reflect on the Marines of yesteryear who fought in our touchstone battles and forged the modem Marine Corps with their courage, integrity, and undying commitment to their fellow Marines. A Little History of Tun Tavern

One of the first lessons a young Marine recruit receives after he leaves the yellow footprints behind is the year and the birthplace of the United States Marine Corps. As well the name of Samuel Nicolas, but vary few learned or remembers the history behind the first recruiting station the Marine Corps had in 1775. On Carpenter's Wharf, now known as Penn's Landing, Mr. Samuel Carpenter chose the corner of Water Street and Tun Alley to build one of the first brew houses in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in 1685. Carpenter named his new brew house Tun Tavern and the tavern soon had a reputation for having the finest beer in all Philadelphia, this reputation lasted for well over a hundred years. There still is a Tun Tavern Brewery and the Tun Tavern site with an historical marker is part of a walking tour in Philadelphia today.

For ninety years Tun Tavern played an important role in American Colonial life. The tavern saw the founding or establishing on American soil several key organizations that are still active today. In 1720 the St. George Society held their first meeting at Tun Tavern. The St. George Society was and is a philanthropic society that helped destitute English emigrants. Eleven years later St John's Lodge also known as the Tun Tavern Lodge, a Grand Lodge of the Masonic Temple had their first meeting at the tavern June 26, 1732 as reported in the Pennsylvania Gazette No. 187, printed by B. Franklin. The Masons of Philadelphia claim that this was the first teaching of the Masonic Temple in America. The third Grand Master of the Mason Lodge was Benjamin Franklin in 1734. In 1747 saw the founding of the St. Andrew's Society, also at Tun Tavern. St. Andrew Society is a charitable organization as well, that seen to the well being of the poor Scottish emigrants.

In the early 1740's Tun Tavern had new proprietors and the tavern went through a major renovation, with a new restaurant added and a name change to "Peggy Mullian's Red Hot Beef Steak Club at Tun Tavern". The restaurant became a who's who of colonial America. The popularity of the restaurant shook Philadelphia and for its day, was one of its hottest gathering places.

War in the Colonies broke out in 1754 with the French and Indians; and the Pennsylvania Colonial Legislature commissioned Col. Benjamin Franklin in 1756 to recruit and command the Pennsylvania Militia as the Colonel Commander to battle the Indians along the frontier with forts near what would become Pittsburgh. Franklin chose the Tun Tavern as his recruiting post and to organize his regiment. As independence from England loomed over the horizon the tavern hosted many of the founding fathers of our nation with the likes of Gen. George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin and on several occasions the First and Second Continental Congress.

November 10, 1775 Tun Tavern became endeared to the hearts of every Marine to have served in the Corps. Stemming from meetings of the Maritime Commission headed by John Adams, and held at the tavern, the findings brought a bought the resolution that the Second Continental Congress passed to create two Battalions of Marines; and commissioned Samuel Nicolas, the first Commandant of the Continental Marines, to recruit those battalions. That day, Nicolas went directly to Tun Tavern and appointed Robert Mullian, the son of Peggy Mullian, as Chief Marine Recruiter. Easy duty giving out free cold beer to prospective recruits who thronged to the tavern to drink a little brew and have the opportunity get to serve in the newly minted Marine Corps and be paid six and two-thirds dollars each month. Less than three weeks later the two battalions were raised and Samuel Nicolas was officially commissioned "Captain of the Marines", and the new Continental Marines joined in the fight for the independence from England.

That two battalions of Marines be raised consisting of one colonel, two lieutenant colonels, two majors and officers as usual in other regiments, that they consist of an equal number of privates with other battalions; that particular care be taken that no person be appointed to office or enlisted into said battalions, but such as are good seamen, or so acquainted with maritime affairs as to be able to serve to advantage by sea. (Resolution of the Continental Congress, 10 November 1775.)
