Lt. Gen. J. T. Conway New Commandant

Lt. Gen. James Conway, is the Corps' 34th commandant The full Senate confirmed Lt. Gen. James Conway to be the 34th commandant of the Marine Corps August 2. Conway, who will also receive a fourth star, will succeed Commandant Gen. Mike Hagee as early as



this November. Lt. General Conway, 58, and a 36-year veteran of the Corps, has been serving as the director of operations, J-3, Joint Staff, Washington, D.C.

Lieutenant General Conway was commissioned in 1970 as an infantry officer and served initially with the 3d Battalion, 1st

Marines, Camp Pendleton, as a rifle platoon commander and as the Battalion's 106mm recoilless-rifle platoon commander. Subsequently, he served as a company commander in the Infantry Training Regiment; as Executive Officer of the Marine Detachment aboard the USS Kitty Hawk (CVA-63); at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego as a series and company commander in the Recruit Training Regiment, as the aide to the Commanding General, and as Director, Sea School. After career level school in 1977, he reported to 3d Battalion, 2d Marines, 2d Marine Division where he commanded two companies and served in the Regiment's S-3. Posted to The Basic School he commanded two companies of officer students and taught tactics. Following intermediate level school, his next tour was as operations officer for the 31st MAU, where he spent 13 months at sea in WESTPAC and in contingency operations off Beirut, Lebanon. Returning to CONUS in July 1984, he was assigned to Headquarters Marine Corps, and later served two years as Senior Aide to the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff. Upon completion of top level school, he was reassigned to the 2d Marine Division serving as Division G-3 Operations Officer before assuming command of 3d Battalion, 2d Marines in January 1990. Under his command Battalion Landing Team 3/2 deployed to Southwest Asia for eight months for Operations DESERT SHIELD and DESERT STORM. Selected for colonel, he was assigned as the Ground Colonels' Monitor, HQMC. He assumed command of The Basic School on April 30, 1993 and in that role was selected for Brigadier General in December 1995. Re-assigned to the Joint Staff, he served as the Deputy Director of Operations J-3 for Combating Terrorism. He then served as the President, Marine Corps University at Quantico, VA. After being selected for promotion to Major General, he assumed command of the 1st Marine Division.

In November of 2002 LtGen Conway was promoted to his current rank and assumed command of the I Marine Expeditionary Force. He commanded I MEF during two combat tours in Iraq. His personal decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with gold stars in lieu of second and third awards, Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal, and the Combat Action Ribbon. Lieutenant General Conway graduated with honors from The Basic School, the U.S. Army Infantry Officers' Advanced Course, the Marine Corps Command and Staff College, and the Air War College.

Commandants of the Marine Corps

1. Samuel Nicholas State of Birth: PA

Dates: B. 1744 D. 27 Aug 1790 Period Served: 28 Nov 1775 - 1781 Initial Rank as CMC: Captain

Final Rank: Major

The resolution of the Continental Congress on 10 November 1775 provided for a colonel to command two battalions of Marines authorized, but the highest rank received by any Marine during the Revolution was that of major. Samuel Nicholas was appointed "Captain of Marines" on 28 November 1775, and promoted to major on 25 June 1776. Because of his senior status among other Marine officers of

the Revolution, he is numbered as the first Commandant. The year 1781 saw Major Nicholas' return to private life. By the summer of 1781 there were only three Marine captains and three lieutenants on active duty, and overall organization had ceased to exist.

2. William Ward Burrows

State of Birth: SC

Dates: B. 16 Jan 1758 D. 6 Mar 1804 Period Served: 12 Jul 1798 - 6 Mar 1804

Initial Rank as CMC: Major Final Rank: Lieutenant Colonel

When Burrows was appointed under authority of the Act of 11 July 1798 (1 Stat. 72) he was not known technically as "Major Commandant." It was not until 1 May 1800, when Burrows was promoted to "Lieutenant Colonel Commandant" under the Act of 22 April 1800 (2 Stat. 29), that there was an alliance of rank and position for the head of the Marine Corps.

3. Franklin Wharton State of Birth: PA

Dates: B. 1767 D. 1 Sep 1818

Period Served: 7 Mar 1084 - 1 Sep 1818 Initial Rank as CMC: Lieutenant Colonel

Final Rank: Lieutenant Colonel

Between Wharton's death and Gale's appointment, Brevet Major Samuel Miller, the Adjutant and Inspector and Brevet Major Archibald Henderson served as Acting Commandant, 2-15 September 1818 and 16 September 1818 - 2 March 1819, respectively.

4. Anthony Gale

State of Birth: Ireland

Dates: B. 17 Sep 1782 D. 1843

Period Served: 3 Mar 1819 - 16 Oct 1820 Initial Rank as CMC: Lieutenant Colonel

Final Rank: Lieutenant Colonel

5. Archibald Henderson State of Birth: VA

Dates: B. 21 Jan 1783 D. 6 Jan 1859 Period Served: 17 Oct 1820 - 6 Jan 1859 Initial Rank as CMC: Lieutenant Colonel

Final Rank: Colonel

By authority of the Act of 30 June 1834 (4 Stat. 32) the rank of Commandant was raised to colonel. On 4 March 1843, Henderson was commissioned brigadier general by brevet for his services during the Florida Indian Wars. Subsequently, he was commonly referred to as Brevet Brigadier General Henderson. This was a personal rank in the nature of a decoration for gallantry. It had nothing to do with the office of the Commandant - less, in fact, than the personal rank held by Heywood. In this connection, it should be noted that, in official correspondence, Henderson usually signed himself "Col. Commdt".

6. John Harris State of Birth: PA

Dates: B. 20 May 1790 D. 2 May 1864 Period Served: 7 Jan 1859 - 12 May 1864

Initial Rank as CMC: Colonel

Final Rank: Colonel

Between the death of Harris and the appointment of Zeilin, Major Augustus S. Nicholson, the Adjutant and Inspector, served as Acting Commandant from 13 May - 9 June 1864.

7. Jacob Zeilin
State of Birth: PA

Dates: B. 16 Jul 1806 D. 18 Nov 1880 Period Served: 10 Jun 1864 - 31 Oct 1876

Initial Rank as CMC: Colonel Final Rank: Brigadier General

The Act of March 1867 (14 Stat. 174) provided that "the commandant of the Marine corps shall have the rank and pay of a brigadier general of the army." This law was repealed by the Act of 6 June 1874 (18 Stat. 216) when the office of Commandant was returned to the rank of colonel when and if a vacancy occurred. Thus, Zeilin retained his rank of brigadier general but his successor was slated to be a colonel.

8. Charles McCawley State of Birth: PA

Dates: B. 29 Jan 1827 D. 13 Oct 1891 Period Served: 1 Nov 1876 - 29 Jan 1891

Initial Rank as CMC: Colonel

Final Rank: Colonel

9. Charles Heywood State of Birth: ME

Dates: B. 3 Oct 1839 D. 26 Feb 1915 Period Served: 30 Jan 1891 - 2 Oct 1903

Initial Rank as CMC: Colonel Final Rank: Major General

By the Act of 3 March 1899 (30 Stat. 413) the post of Commandant was again raised to that of brigadier general; Heywood was promoted as of that date. The Act of 1 July 1902 (32 Stat. 1368) accorded the Commandant the rank, pay, and allowances of a major general in the army. This act, however, specifically provided that should a vacancy occur in the office "on the expiration of the service of the present incumbent, by retirement or otherwise, the commandant of the Marine Corps shall thereafter have the rank, pay, and allowances of a brigadier-general." Thus, Heywood's final rank must be considered to have been personal in character.
