COMMANDANTS' CORNER

As of November 3d we had only nine members who committed to marching in the Veterans Day Parade on November 10th. It would be much better if more of you would participate. That said; the detachment will form on Jefferson Street between 11th and 12th Streets,

which is a change from the information I provided a few days ago. Please be there no later than 9:30 AM. The uniform is MCL cover, the detachment red sweatshirt, black trousers and dark shoes. If you need additional information contact me.

If you are participating, then you need to be in the vicinity of the assembly area by 8:30 AM or so. If you are not there that early, then finding a parking place will be a difficult for you. The assembly area is between 10th and 13th Streets and State Street on the north and Idaho Street on the south. I think it best if you look for parking either north of State Street or west of 13th Street. You cannot park within the assembly area. Of course you can also choose to park in one of the downtown parking garages, and walk to the assembly area.

Sales of the raffle tickets for the Alaska Cruise are not progressing well. We have sold approximately 150 tickets, and we need to sell about 310 to break even. We printed a total of 1,000 tickets in the belief that at \$10.00 a chance we had a good fundraiser, but only a few of the members who committed to this endeavor have done anything to advance its success. This situation is discouraging.

In other correspondence I asked each member to purchase at least one ticket as a gift for a friend or acquaintance. As I stated, \$10.00 is a very inexpensive gift and I think that it is an expense that most members can bear, but as of this writing I am the only member who has purchased any gift tickets. In case you are wondering whether I am following my own request, I purchased three gift tickets.

With money raised through events associated with the National Convention and from the AR-15 Riffle Raffle the detachment raised enough money to make several worthy donations that you all know about. We have also set aside money to remodel a trailer to use as a replacement Coffee Wagon. We raise money to support worthy veteran projects and the Young Marines, and occasionally we have given money to Marines in distress. However, we can only do those things if the membership supports our fundraising events.

We have approximately 100 members of which 12 do 90% of the detachment's work and another 17 will occasionally get involved in detachment activities. And then, there are 14 members whose age and/or physical condition limits their ability to get involved in detachment activities. That means there are some 50 members who do nothing other than pay their annual dues if they are not Life Members.

We also have a few members who make significant direct contributions. Recently that select group includes Robert Chester, Chris Christopher, Frank Partridge, and Bill Johnson.

That is the situation. I ask again, please take direct action to support the Alaska Cruise Raffle by purchasing a gift ticket or two, and also by selling a few tickets. In addition to the work of Arnie Strawn arranging for and placing a fundraising table at various locations, I have sold 37 and Dave Swickard has sold about 25. It is not all that difficult to sell a few tickets, so please get out of the starting blocks and take action.

This year's ride began at VFW post 63 and concluded at Quinn's restaurant. We haven't tallied all the toys yet but I know the Ride collected over 150 toys and nearly \$5000, all to benefit the children of the Treasure, Magic and Wood River valley areas - as you all probably know, every bit collected here stays here. I know the League is always willing to pitch in to support Toys for Tots and I appreciate all the presence and assistance of our members during this busy, and crucial, time. Let me say in advance that I don't always know exactly WHEN we will need assistance so it's not a lack of gratitude that causes me to sometimes turn down offers of help, I just can't put everyone to work sometimes due to a lack of toys at that moment, or sometimes we have all the help here that we can use. Please don't let these setbacks dissuade you from participating in the Toys for Tots program in some way. Even if it's getting a group of members together on a Saturday or Sunday to 'man a box' at a local store or take coffee to those young Marines standing at Wal-Mart or Toys 'R' Us soliciting. We sincerely appreciate everything that League members have done for the Corps and we value the dedication that keeps you giving to support the Corps.

GENTEXT/REMARKS/1. AS WE PAUSE TO CELEBRATE THE 237TH BIRTHDAY OF OUR CORPS, WE REFLECT ON THE RICH LEGACY OF SERVICE HANDED DOWN TO US, WE RECOMMIT OURSELVES TO THE TASKS AT HAND, AND WE LOOK FORWARD TOWARD A BRIGHT FUTURE IN SERVICE TO OUR COUNTRY.

- 2. MARINES EXIST TO FIGHT AND WIN OUR NATION'S BATTLES. WE ARE MOST PROUD OF OUR WELL-EARNED REPUTATION FOR ANSWERING THE CLARION CALL FIRST. THIS WAS NEVER MORE EVIDENT THAN AT THE EPIC BATTLE OF GUADALCANAL 70 YEARS AGO. PICKED TO LEAD THE FIRST ALLIED COUNTER-OFFENSIVE OF THE PACIFIC WAR BECAUSE THEY WERE THE "MOST READY," MARINES LANDED ON 7 AUGUST 1942 IN THE SOLOMON ISLANDS. THEY PERSEVERED THROUGH MONTHS OF UNREMITTING DEPRIVATION AND BITTER COMBAT. Idaho Power to Discount Camping Fees for Seniors and Disabled Vets Jan. 1

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 30, 2012 -- Idaho Power has approved a three-year pilot program to provide discounted fees to service-disabled military veterans and senior visitors to our parks, beginning Jan. 1, 2013.

Any service-related disability would qualify an individual to receive a 50% discount on overnight camping fees, whereas seniors (age 60 and over) will receive \$2 off per night in the peak season, at any of our parks where overnight camping is allowed.

Invasion orders found wrapped around cigars in field led to bloodiest day in U.S. history

This 1862 photograph made available by the Library of Congress shows casualties from the Battle of Antietam near the church of the pacifist Dunker sect near Sharpsburg, Md. When dawn broke along Antietam Creek on Sept. 17, 1862, cannon volleys launched a Civil War battle that would leave 23,000 casualties on the single bloodiest day in U.S. history and mark a crucial pivot point in the war. And yet it might never have occurred - if not for what a historian calls a "freakish" twist of fate. Days earlier, a copy of Gen. Robert E. Lee's detailed invasion orders, wrapped around a few cigars, accidentally fell in a farm field and were discovered by Union infantrymen who passed their stunning find up the chain of command, spurring action.
